# **Highlights**



Young people aged 15-24 represent **13%** of the United States as of 2023 <sup>1</sup>. In 2022, they ranked 3rd in the number of new human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) cases <sup>2</sup>.

In 2021, only **81%** of AYA\* in the US were **linked to HIV care** compared to other age groups **(83%)**. Although they accounted for **19%** of all new HIV cases, only **13%** used PrEP<sup>3</sup>.




As of 2023, young people account for **3% of all HIV** cases in New Mexico <sup>4</sup>.

18% of youth aged 13-24 in New Mexico living with HIV are in stage 3 of the disease 4.




As of 2023, AYA make up 19% of New Mexico's population. In 2023, youth represented 18% of new HIV cases.

# **Regions & Race/Ethnicity**



In 2023, the Metro and Southwest regions had the highest number of residing youth with HIV. This is followed by the Southeast, Northwest, then Northeast areas of the state.



As of 2023, Asian American/Pacific Islander youth ages 13-24 are the smallest age group living with HIV in NM (1%).



Across New Mexico, young men makeup 84% of all HIV cases. They also made up most of the new cases in 2023.




Young women represent the remaining 14% of all HIV cases in 2023.

## **Mode of Exposure**

NM Youth Living with HIV by Mode of Exposure, 2023

Men who have sex with men (MSM) is the most often reported mode of HIV exposure within those between the ages of 13-24 (62%).



High risk heterosexual behavior (10%) and injection drug use (2%) are two other ways that NM youth report being exposed to HIV.

The New Mexico Department of Health (NMDOH) HIV Prevention Program has highlighted the need for enhanced and expanded HIV prevention efforts that are culturally specific and target the adolescent and young adult community. Programs should be tailored to varying groups across the state, including new immigrants, non-English speakers, and region of residence.

## Prevention Funds will support these activities in 2025:

- Funding events in various locations around the state to educate and raise awareness of HIV in New Mexico, highlighting adolescent and young adult populations most at risk.
- Partnership with Teen MPower to **continue HIV and syphilis testing** for adolescents, as well as collaboration with the Common Bond U21 group to test their LGBTQ youth group once a month.
- Using the Social Network Strategy for HIV Testing Recruitment, HIV Prevention contractors are recruiting young Latinx MSM (men who have sex with men) and Black MSM to increase HIV testing and linkage to care within their communities.
- Continuing to offer PrEP to the community at **no cost to participants**.
