# HIV Long-Term Survivors Awareness Day

**June 5, 2025** 

**Highlights** 

### HIV Long-Term Survivors (HLTS) are:

- those that were diagnosed with HIV/AIDS prior to Highly Active Antiretroviral Therapy (HAART) availability in 1996,
- those who have lived with HIV/AIDS for over 10 years,
- those who were infected prenatally or under the age of 5 (Dandelion)
- those who acquired HIV through blood transfusion



In 2023, **4,139** people are living with HIV/AIDS in New Mexico. Among them, **2,696 (65%) are HLTS**<sup>4</sup>. People with HIV/AIDS are living longer lives due to the availability of HAART<sup>5</sup>.




Nationally, approximately **300,000** people are considered **HLTS**. They make up **25%** of all people with HIV/AIDS<sup>5</sup>.




### NM HLTS by Population Density Area, 2023

As of 2023, most HLTS (52%) reside in the metro region of New Mexico. The majority of HLTs live in an urban setting<sup>4</sup>.




As of 2023, males make up about 88% of NM HLTS

# **Mode of Exposure**


NM HLTS by Mode of Exposure, 2023



Males who have sex with males (MSM) is the most often reported mode of HIV exposure within NM HLTS (62%). The category "Other" is made up of HLTS exposed via perinatal contact (0.74%) and blood products (0.22%).

## Age

As of 2023, those belonging to the age group of 55+ make up the majority (57%) of HLTS in NM.

NMHealth HIV Services helps to provide support groups for people living with HIV across New Mexico through in person and virtual long-term survivor meetings. Groups like Thriving with HIV and Meals & Meds provide the opportunity to build community and find peer support to navigate new challenges and experiences living with HIV.

People living with HIV who reach and maintain viral suppression are undetectable. This supports the prevention approach of Undetectable = Untransmittable (U=U). Services like insurance and medication assistance help to maintain access to care.
